District Formative Assessments Universal Screeners: Easy CBM, STAR Early Literacy, and STAR Enterprise **Administration Window:** Fall, Winter, and Spring

Required: Yes

Applicable Federal/State Law: Universal screeners are required by TDOE to determine students eligible for additional services. Purpose and Use: A universal screener is administered to ALL students to determine whether students demonstrate the skills necessary to achieve grade-level standards. Universal screening reveals which students are performing at or above the level considered necessary for achieving long-term success (general outcome measures). This data can also serve as a benchmark for measuring the improvement of a group, class, grade, school, or district. Universal screening can be used to identify students in need of further intervention due to identified skill deficits below the 25th percentile. A more precise assessment may be needed to determine a student's specific area(s) of deficit before beginning an intervention. Student progress will be monitored every two weeks in the areas of identified skill deficits.

Results to Parents and Students: Parents will receive universal screening results with the student's progress report.
